<u>Our Children Say:</u>

- I liked it when we all got to plant beanstalks! I want to climb up in when it's grown enough!
- We have been learning about 3D shapes. 3D shapes fat and 2D shapes are flat!
- We were learning about vegetables and in Oliver's vegetables, he tries lots of different ones!
- I love everyone in our Nursery!
- We have loved playing and exploring outside in the sunshine!



This Half-term

- This half term our topic has been 'Food & Growth'. Our first focus text was Jasper's Beanstalk and we planted our own beans (not seeds!) We watched and observed changes to our beans over a few weeks and will be bringing them home at the end of the term to continue to look after them! Our second focus text has been Oliver's vegetables. We have been talking about different vegetables and using words to describe them! We have also been drawing and labeling our favourite vegetables too and through our daily phonics, becoming more aware of rhyme, alliteration and sounds!
- In maths, we have been learning about concepts such as more and fewer, using this language to compare two groups. In addition, we have been recapping our knowledge of 2D shapes and started to look at 3D shapes.
- We had a super yellow day! We made our own sunflowers and sunshine using lots of creative materials and tried lots of yummy (and sour!) yellow foods, including melon, bananas, cheddar cheese and lemon!
- We have enjoyed joining in lots of wonderful celebrations this half term, inclduing St. Catherine of Siena day, VE day celebrations and our Pentecost Party! What an exciting half term it has been!











<u>Our Children Say:</u>

- "I like it when the hen comes and lays a golden egg. Jack steals it from the Giant.'
- "We've been learning different ways to make ten. 5 and 5 makes ten."
- "When you put a seed in the ground it can grow into a plant or a tree or a flower."

This Half-term:

- This half term our topic has been 'Food & Growth. We have been planting and caring for plants in our outdoor area such as a blackcurrant bush, herbs like mint and flowers such as forget me nots. The children know that plants need sunlight, water and nutrients from the soil to grow.
- In literacy we have explored the traditional tale 'Jack and the beanstalk'. We were astonished to find 'magic beans' in our classroom and planted them. The children worked in groups to retell the story in sequence using refrains and expression as the different characters.
- In the maths we have been looking at the composition of number ten using different equipment. Using counters in a specific formation on a dice or ten frame, supports our subitising and quick recognition of numbers to ten using the '5 and a bit' method. The children can express verbally number bonds to five and ten.
- This half term has been full of celebrations such as VE day. We waved flags and enjoyed dancing to war time songs. The children made peace doves to symbolise the peace we have due to the ending of the Second World War.





Our Children Say:

- I loved doing our class worship to our grown-ups! We got to make flower crowns and say the Hail Mary in different languages!
- I liked it in Science when we got to go on a plant hunt around school. I didn't know we had so many different plants on the playground
- I loved being a king for the day! I felt really important.









- In D&T, we have learnt about Charles
 Wicksteed, an engineer who designed
 playgrounds. We learnt about his designs and
 then made our own playground equipment
 using recyclable materials.
- In History, we have been focusing on Kings & Queens. We have learnt what the monarchy means, the role of a monarch and even received a letter from King Charles! To help King Charles, we wrote a letter about what we would do if we were a monarch for a day.
- In Art we have been learning about 'Jeff Koons' We have been inspired by his work and we have designed and made our very own 3D aliens. We used plasticine to make a prototype and air dry clay to create our masterpieces.
- In English we have been reading our new story 'Toys in space'. We have created our own descriptive stories based on the book with our very own characters.

This Half-term:



 \cdot This half term, we have been using the book 'Journey' in English to help us write descriptively. Journey is a wordless book, so we have had to use our detective skills to infer lots of the information. It has helped us to create effective settings and use our imagination to add detail.

· In Religion, we have been learning about Pentecost and the Power of the Holy Spirit. We have learnt about the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit and how we can put these into action in our daily lives.



 \cdot In Maths, we have just started to learn Roman numerals to 12 and how to tell the time. Telling the time is a challenging skill and we are working hard to master this!

· In Art, we have been learning how to model, shape cut and apply a variety of techniques when working with clay. Our work has been inspired by the fantastic Japanese artist Yayoi Kusama.





Canoeing was AMAZING! We got to go down the rapids and we had a race! We went pond dipping and we found lots of fascinating invertebrates like blood worms and mayflies!



This Half-term:

- In Science, we have learning about living things and their habitats. We learnt the difference between vertebrates and invertebrates and classified them using a key.
- In English, we have been writing non-chronological reports about the Sloth.
 We have done lots of research, learnt lots of facts and will present this as an information board as if it is at the zoo.
 - In maths, it's been all about fractions and decimals and learning to convert, compare and order them.
- Class 9 delivered an awesome assembly on St Catherine. Picture below!

This half-term:

The School Council have continued being excellent ambassadors throughout the school this term.

They have also been tasked with judging the 'Attendance Logo' design competition which will take place next term - a very important job!





T<u>his half-term</u>:

<u>Nursery</u>: Our wonderful Nursery children have been learning the song Dabbling ducks which helps them learn about how ducks move and their habitats. The children were invited to dance along as ducks as we sang the song altogether. They moved their bodies like ducks to turn upside down, their mouths like beaks for quacking, arms for flapping, bottoms for wiggling and waggling tails as they sang each verse. They were all AMAZING and enjoyed handling the variety of colourful toy ducks that I provided for their lessons.

<u>Reception:</u> Our musical Year one classes have been learning Up and down which is a gentle action song with a rising and falling melody for exploring pitch. In this unit, the children have sung various songs in steps using accompanying actions, for example, Hickory, dickory, dock. and 'Five, fine bumble bees.' They are continuing to compose new lyrics and play simple melodies on pitched instruments next term.

<u>Year 1:</u> In our topic 'Musical conversations' the children have created musical conversations on the Glockenspiel. They have invented and composed short pieces based around question-and-answer interactions/dialogue. They have also learned to take turns, to lead and follow, to read a 'score', and have created their own simple graphic scores. They have also prepared some super songs for their upcoming 'Singing Square' including 'Baby Beluga' and 'Menu Song' and always sing enthusiastically!

<u>Year 2:</u> Orawa (pronounced 'Arva') describes a huge river. The children have listened to the music, and imagined the journey of the river through Europe, making decisions about the scenery and events it passes on its way. They have created a huge piece of art based on the river's journey borrowing ideas from the composer, Kilar and have invented new music using vocal chants and body percussion. Children, you are fab musicians - enthusiastic, engaged, interested and energised in every single lesson!







Year 3: Our ukulele players in Year 3 have been busily preparing some pieces for our Lower Key Stage Celebration in church and are making very good progress! They have been learning chords, for example, F Major , C and C7 and different strumming patterns including a Calypso Strumming pattern. They are also focusing now on preparing the music for their special Holy Communion Day!

Year 4: Year 4 children have immersed themselves with enjoyment in 'Favourite Song' - A sing-and-play song for ukuleles, in a folk-rock style, with a Verse/Chorus structure, and a fast, driving beat. They've listened to and been inspired by similar music e.g. Mumford and Sons The song is based around the chords of A minor, C major, F major, and G major. They have added their own unique style to the song and a group of children have even accompanied the song with KAZOOS! You are an imaginative bunch and such fun to teach! Your vocals are 'Spot on' as well! Year 5: Not only has Year 5 had the opportunity to learn rhythms during our awesome 'BUCKET DRUMMING' lessons, they have also been practising and perfecting tunes on guitars and learning chords for the forthcoming Upper Key Stage 2 Celebration in church. In addition, they have been inspired by a beautiful lullaby from the Shetland Islands - 'Baloo Baleerie' - one of the most ancient types of song. They have explored lullabies from across the globe, learned about 3/4 time, as well as sung and played an accompaniment to the lullaby on the Glockenspiel.

Year 6: Year 6 children have truly worked with great energy and commitment in their 'FINISH THIS' project. This involved working with the English National Opera to finish an unfinished composition in a creative and original way using classroom percussion.

Class 14 -Wow! A huge congratulations on your fantastic composition Serenity. Both compositions were listened to by: Dominic Haddock, ENO Director of Philanthropy and Partnerships, Development. All our children were proudly presented with a certificate and a personal thanks from Omar Shahryar, the composer. And here is your feedback:

Ahhh - I felt the peaceful serenity shining through straightaway through your beautifully sung melodic line. This piece was full of brilliant musical ideas, I could hear the breeze whispering through the grass and I loved the 'murky swamp' section too! The constant chime of the cymbal towards the end was a wonderful addition. Great job!

And here is your feedback: What a funky, driving vocal line - a fantastic opening to your piece. Your creativity and curiosity really shone through the piece, and I love the way you explored different sounds, words and musical ideas all giving me loads of zesty, green, zingy energy!
